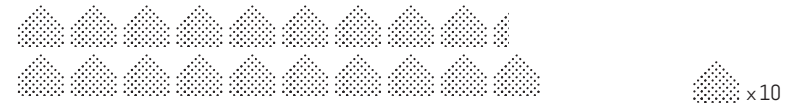
The Seneca Waterways Council camps:

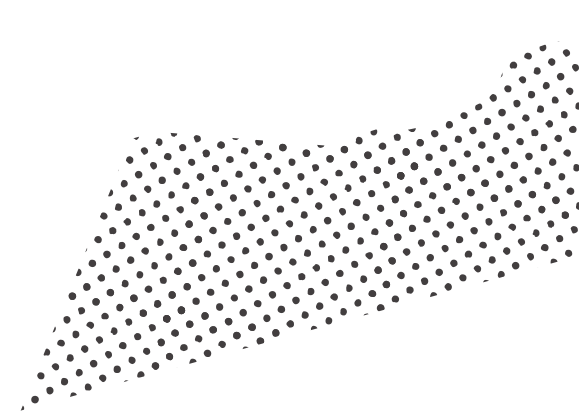

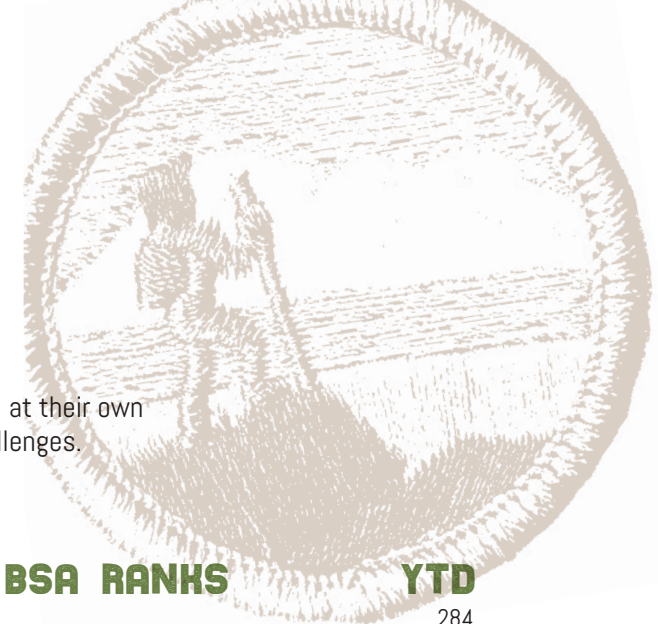

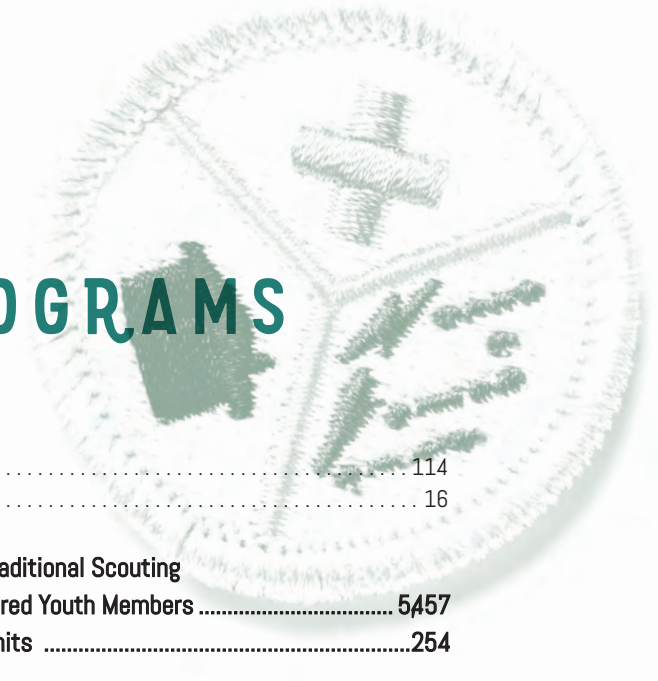
