

DISTINGUISHED EAGLE SCOUT

The Distinguished Eagle Scout Award is an award of esteemed recognition presented by the Boy Scouts of America. It is awarded to an adult Eagle Scout for a lifetime of distinguished service in his profession and to his local community after attaining the level of Eagle Scout.

Honoree:

Albert Paley, Artist

Albert Paley is an internationally recognized artist and metal sculptor. His work has been commissioned by both public and private corporations throughout the world. 
